

Bishop Mark J. Webb's Christmas Message December 16, 2015

The days leading up to Christmas have always been my favorite. It is a time of anticipation and expectation. As a child, many things were a part of this season. There were the traditional Christmas programs I never missed, programs like "Santa Claus is Coming to Town," "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer," and of course, "A Charlie Brown Christmas." My dad and I would put up the outdoor Christmas lights. Our family would go together to search for the "perfect" Christmas tree. There were special services and programs we would participate in at our church. We would set up the nativity, the very one that sits in our house today. And, of course, there was the annual visit to see Santa Claus.

I still enjoy many of those things that made this season so magical as a child. But as I continue to "grow up," I am coming to understand in a deeper way how important the days leading up to Christmas are. I'm attempting to move from getting ready to *celebrate* Christmas to getting ready to *be changed by the promise and truth* of Christmas.

We find ourselves living in a time that many of us have never experienced before. While the world has always been filled with violence, injustice, and despair, the days we experience seem filled with event after event that remind us: We live in a world that needs the promise of Christmas. We live in a time where those who follow Jesus have the potential to share with a hurting humanity the promise of healing and hope - a message of justice and love beyond comprehension.

As we get ready to celebrate Christmas, I wonder how we are getting ready to be changed by the promise of Christmas? Are we boldly sharing that promise with the world? External preparations are fun, but how are our internal preparations of mind, heart, and spirit taking priority? How are we opening our lives in a deeper way, so that we might truly live among the world as people changed by the truth of Christmas? How are we preparing for and anticipating God to use us, our actions, and our words to proclaim to the present reality of the world, that there is another way?

The words of Isaiah must speak into and through our lives:

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness — on them light has shined. For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. His authority shall grow continually, and there shall be endless peace for the throne of David and his kingdom. He will establish and uphold it with justice and with righteousness from this time onward and forevermore.

The promise of Christmas is Jesus! The truth of Christmas is Jesus! The hope for the injustice and despair of our world is Jesus! The hope for the brokenness of the Church is Jesus! The hope for me and for you is Jesus!

In these days leading up to Christmas, let us open our lives to Jesus in a fresh way. Let us be open to the promises of Jesus to give us new life and a new way of living. May we boldly offer Jesus to the world, believing that He will give to the world a new way! Let's not simply get ready for another celebration of Christmas, let's get ready to be changed by Jesus in a deeper way and to offer that promise of change to those around us.

Prophesy #1: SIN and DEATH

God created the earth, animals and mankind... And said it was good. Adam and Eve were created to worship and fellowship with God. They lived in an environment that was perfect: they had work (tending the Garden), they had food (fruit and vegetables), they had clean air and clean water, and they had no sickness or disease.

Adam and Eve had rules. They were not to eat the fruit of the "Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil." They were also given free will. (the ability to make choices.) (good or bad.)

Unfortunately, Satan tempted and deceived Eve and she made a choice to disobey God and persuade Adam to do the same. Thus, sin entered the world, and there were consequences.

Consequences included: Adam and Eve having to leave the Garden, Adam having to work hard to get crops to grow, and Eve having pain in childbirth. (Gen. 3:16-19)

PORK AND BEAN BREAD Peggy Pearce

Combine and set aside to cool:

1 cup raisins

1 cup boiling water



Mash one 15-oz. can pork and beans until very smooth.

Add:

2 cups sugar

3 eggs, beaten

1 cup vegetable oil

1 tsp. vanilla

Stir until well mixed.

Fold in:

3 cups flour

1tsp. cinnamon

tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. baking soda

Drain raisins and fold into batter along with 1 cup chopped nuts. Spoon batter into three greased and floured loaf pans. Bake at 325° for 50-60 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean.
