Greetings in Christ!

1 Corinthians 13:13 says, And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.





collects for the Food Pantry on the 1st Sunday of each month. Please place donations in the bin in the Green St. Foyer.




CHEESY BUFFALO CHICKEN DIP Sue Simmons 8 oz. cream cheese, softened

DUDLEY TAILS

The month of February celebrates love. A poet once said, "How do I love thee? Let me count the ways." Dudley's master loves him in many ways... like these:

1. Dudley, you were the last puppy of the litter... and your <u>master chose you</u> to come home.

- 2. Dudley, your master paid a price for you... and said, "you belong to me."
- 3. Dudley, your master <u>delights in you</u>... from the way you wiggle, to the nudge of your nose.
- 4. Dudley, your master loves you... and wants you to be of good character: kind, gentle, helpful and obedient.
- 5. Dudley, if you truly belong to your master, you will <u>know your master's voice</u> and what you are being asked to do.
- 6. Dudley, when you have an unbreakable bond with your master, you have the assurance that your master will <u>never leave you</u> or forsake you.

On another level... we too have a Master who wants a relationship with us. 1. In the second book of Thessalonians, chapter 2, verse 13, we are told that, "God <u>chose you</u> to be saved through... belief in the truth." Jesus said, "I am the way, and the truth..." (John 14:6)

2. Our Master paid a price for us. He paid with his life. Therefore, He has the right to say, "<u>you belong to</u> <u>me</u>." In the book of Romans, chapter 14, (at the end of verse 8) it says, "whether we live or die, we (who acknowledge Jesus as our Master) belong to the Lord.

3. Something that is delightful makes us smile. Something that we experience may be delightful if it lifts our spirits. So, when the Psalmist says, (in Psalms 149:4) "the Lord <u>takes delight</u> in his people," it means that when God's people sing his praises and acknowledge his greatness, he is pleased.

4. Our Master wants us to <u>be of good character</u> too. If we are to be called Christians, then everything that we say and do must reflect the loving nature of our Lord. People should see that we are different... in a good way. And when we fail... (and we will fail sometimes) we should reflect the love and patience of our Lord. "Clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience." (Colossians 3:12)

5. A dog knows <u>his master's voice</u>. Others may try to imitate it, but the dog will not be fooled. A happy dog will hear and respond to his master's voice. Likewise, a Christian will (at times) hear God or his Master speak. The Master would not ask the Believer to do anything wrong. In the New Testament book of John we read: "He who belongs to God hears what God says." (John 8:47)

6. A loving master would never abandon his dog and move away. Nor would a loving master take care of his own wants and needs, but neglect the health and safety of his dependent. Our Master will <u>never leave us</u> or forsake us. The book of Matthew, chapter 28, verse 20, concludes by quoting the last words of the risen Christ: "I am with you always, to the very end of the age." What a wonderful Master we have!

Visioning into the New Year

Matthew 22:37-39 Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'

The year of 2022 has begun! How many of us have made New Year's resolutions? Resolutions are the promises we make to lose weight, exercise regularly, eat healthier, offer random acts of kindness, to laugh daily and to begin or return to church.

What if we changed our way of thinking and change our resolutions to practicing spiritual disciplines in order to grow in faith individually, as a family, as a church, as a district, and as a conference? The spiritual disciplines I follow are Wesley's Five Means of Grace: Prayer, Searching the Scriptures, The Lord's Supper, Fasting and Christian Conferencing.

During my times of prayer, I seek God's leading for the Cornerstone District, the Upper New York Conference, and the United Methodist Church, by asking the questions, "what is God's will and what is God's vision, for 2022 as we continue to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world? And living the Gospel of Jesus Christ and being God's love with our neighbors in all places." (The Upper New York Conference)

So, what is a vision?

- "A vision is developed with the tension between what is and what could be. (We currently pay our Shared Ministries in full but not on time.)
- There is a moral element and a sense of conviction. (Shared Ministries is our first benevolence and a desire to do good to others as a United Methodist Church.)
- A vision is a preferred future and destination. (Paying our Shared Ministries in full and on time).
- A vision always stands in contrast to the world as it is. (As a connectional church we can do more good together than we can do alone. We accomplish what no single church, district or annual conference ever could hope to do alone.)
- A vision sets our direction and it serves as a road map." (We combine our prayers, presence, gifts and service to make a significant difference in the lives of God's people. Our Shared Ministries reach people locally, nationally and globally.)

I prayerfully challenge us together, to make 2022 a year of paying our Shared Ministries in full, and on time and in doing so making a significant difference in the lives of God's people, sharing the hope that is found only in Jesus Christ. Remembering that we can do more together than we ever could alone and truly being God's love with our neighbors in all places. Trusting that God can do more than we ask or imagine!


Did You Know That Groundhog Day Has Christian Origins? Meg Bucher | Writer and Author

Groundhog Day is the celebratory holiday in American when Punxsutawney Phil's shadow tells us how much more of winter we have left to endure. If the Northwestern Pennsylvanian groundhog sees his shadow, legend states that we will experience six more weeks of winter. Tens of thousands gather annually to witness the animal emerge, in hopes that he will not see his shadow, signaling that spring will arrive early.

But that's not all there is to this holiday. Its origins actually rest in the hands of Christians in celebration of The Feast of Candlemas. German settlers of the Pennsylvania area brought the tradition of predicting the length of winter via hedgehog across the ocean. Groundhogs were so common to the area they settled in, that they eventually started to consult what we can only assume to be Punxsutawney Phil's ancestors.

In Germany, candles were distributed in the wintertime, and blessed by clergy on Candlemas Day. The celebration, also referred to as the Feast of Christ's Presentation in the Temple, is symbolically associated with a special blessing of candles to represent Simeon's proclamation of Jesus as "the light of the Gentiles." Daniel Lattier writes that, "it commemorates the day when 40 days after his birth, according to Jewish custom, Jesus Christ would have been brought to the Jerusalem Temple so that his mother could be ritually purified and he offered to God."

How did this religious commemoration become a staple of weather forecasting? <u>Intellectual Takeout</u> quoted The Handbook of Christian Feasts and Customs, which states, "Popular belief claims that bad weather and cloudy skies of February 2 mean an early and prosperous summer. If the sun shines through the greater part of Candlemas Day, there will be forty more days of snow."
