

Dear Church Family,



### SUNDAY ADULT BIBLE STUDY with Cheryl

Greetings to our class members and to potential class members! As we ponder how something that we cannot see, can get into our bodies... spread to a number of organs... and eventually even take away one's breathing... we find it incomprehensible.



Greater yet is the knowledge that a virus can so quickly move from country to country and multiply the number of people that it infects. One day someone is fine, and in a matter of days, that person could be gone. It makes us think of the complexity of life and of what can happen if we don't listen to the experts in times of strife.

In the history of the Jewish people, there were times when some person or nation suffered from an illness or plague. Read the story of the plagues that came upon the Egyptians because they would not release the Jews who were their slave labor. (Exodus 7:14- Exodus 12:13) Read the story of Job, a righteous Jew who not only lost all his children, but suffered from painful boils and the criticism of his friends. (Job Chapter 1)

Then, in the book of Revelation, we read about a number of supernatural events that will occur in the future. They include:

- 1. Painful sores on people who have the Mark of the Beast.
- 2. The sea will turn to blood, and living creatures in the sea will die,
- 3. Rivers and springs will become blood.
- 4. The sun will scorch people with fire.
- 5. Darkness, pain, and sores will come upon mankind.

### A Brief History of Father's Day

Father's Day, celebrated in the United States on the third Sunday of June, got a jump start from the formation of Mother's Day. Credit for beginning Father's Day celebrations is given to Sonora Smart Dodd from Spokane, Washington.

At the turn of the century, Mother's Day observances were growing across the United States. The federal government had yet to recognize the holiday, but many states had adopted the third Sunday in May as a special celebration day honoring mothers. It was during a Mother's Day church service on June 20, 1909, that Sonora Smart Dodd was struck with the idea of creating a special holiday to honor fathers, too.


When Sonora was 16, her mother died while giving birth to her sixth child, the last of five sons. Back then, like today, single parenthood was no easy task. By Sonoma's account, though, Mr. Smart did a wonderful job. Because of this love and esteem, Sonoma Smart Dodd believed that her father deserved a special time of honor just like that given to mothers on Mother's Day.


In 1909, Sonoma Smart Dodd approached the Spokane YMCA and the Spokane Ministerial Alliance and suggested that her father's birthday — June 5 — become a celebration day for Father's Day. Because they wanted more time to prepare, the Ministerial Alliance chose June 19 instead.

The first Father's Day was thus observed in the State of Washington on June 19, 1910. The idea of officially celebrating fatherhood spread quickly across the United States, as more and more states adopted the holiday. In 1924, President Calvin Coolidge recognized Father's Day as the third Sunday in June of that year and encouraged states to do the same. Congress officially recognized Father's Day in 1956 with the passage of a joint resolution.

Ten years later, in 1966, President Lyndon Johnson issued a proclamation calling for the third Sunday in June to be recognized as Father's Day. In 1972, President Richard Nixon permanently established the observance of the third Sunday in June as Father's Day in the United States. Sonora Smart Dodd lived to see her idea come to fruition. She died in 1978 at the ripe old age of 96.

Some times in our exuberance to follow our Master, we too make a mis-step that causes pain. But we are not alone. Our Master's gentle voice, and His comforting touch are immediately recognized. We are surrounded by our Master's arms and by the warmth of His love.

In the embrace of our Master, we feel strengthened and calmed... for He has told us, "Peace I leave with you." (John 14:27) And, (in the arms of our Master), we feel, "safe and secure from all alarm." (As the writer of the old hymn "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" has said.)

Pain hurts. Ask any child who has been wrongly disciplined for something that his sibling has done. Likewise, the bible warns of the pain that Believers will face. They will be "hard pressed… perplexed… persecuted… and struck down, (but not destroyed). (2 Corinthians 4:8-9)

Following Jesus is not an easy task. In the days after Jesus' death, many believers and apostles faced ridicule, persecution, jail, starvation, and even death. Today believers may face ridicule, persecution, jail, starvation and even death, depending upon, in what country of the world they live.

Dudley's reward for following his Master was the presence, loving concern, and comfort given by his master. Our reward for following our Master will be the presence, love, and joy given by our Master in our eternal home. Praise the Lord!

Naomi Scoville, who is teaching in Kosovo, sent this report: "Kosovo shut down pretty completely during the pandemic. March 18 was the last day of in-person school. The government put severe restrictions into place pretty quickly. For one week, we were only allowed to leave our homes between 6am-10am and 4pm-8pm, and only to go to the grocery store, pharmacy, or ATM. They then instituted even stricter measures which only gave us an allotted 90 minutes / day to move around outside our homes, based on ID number. Again, it was only for going to the grocery store, pharmacy, or ATM. The sale of textiles was prohibited, with the exception of hygiene and health supplies. Entire sections of the grocery store (such as where you would find pots and pans) were roped off to prevent people from purchasing those goods. Everyone had to wear face masks in public. There was an increased police presence to ensure everyone was complying with the orders. The borders to surrounding countries were closed. The city of Prishtina was placed under quarantine, which meant no one could enter or leave unless they were granted a special permit (one example is a permit being granted to a pastor allowing him to take food to families in a village). There was a constant police presence at all of the roads leading out of Prishtina, and police stopped cars to ask to see documentation indicating that they were allowed to be out."

**David and Deb Battistoni** spent January and February in Myrtle Beach. They returned to Cuba March 2 and made it to church one Sunday before everything stopped. Deb says: "We miss being with people, going out to dinner, and especially seeing our family." They take lots of walks and go for groceries once a week. They see son, Joel and grandson Lucas, as well as Deb's Mom. David has watched many episodes of Gunsmoke, and Deb has done countless sudoku puzzles. Deb says they have done some long overdue cleaning out. She started with her sock drawer, but found no money stashed away. She says they brushed up on old skills and relearned how to sell things on both eBay and Craig's List. We had stuff that we hadn't used in years and know that we will never need them again." She adds "Thankfully, the weather is getting better, and that helps perk us up! We want to get our normal lives back!"

**Thela Snow** is laying low, staying at home...she has sewn many masks. She has put her Air BNB business on hold temporarily.

**Jim Travis** has kept his regular schedule at the Church, from 8am-1pm Monday – Thursday. He also has kept his part time job taking care of the Library's yard. The grass doesn't know the Library is closed...it just keeps growing!

The **Hupps** are both involved in maintaining their rental properties, and have included Michael in much of the work. JoAnn and Christopher have been keeping up with school via Zoom.

### Hi to All from the Wildrick's.

Dean has been dropping big, old trees, dragging them down from the woods, sawing them into chunks, and splitting them. Finally the wood is stacked to dry and to use next winter for heating the house.

On dry days, I am working outside, lopping low tree branches, removing Multi Floral Rose, and clearing other brush. At the beginning of May I had an accident while working, and had to go to Urgent Care for seven stitches in my lower left leg.

Dudley's groomer appointment was cancelled due to Corona virus. I began cutting his 4" winter coat, but after two hours, we were both tired of standing! So presently, Dudley is trimmed everywhere except his back. 'More to come. Dean and I have been enjoying Pastor Becky's sermons on DVD. These are available to all. Ask our secretary Jim. God's blessing upon you all. Continue to let your light shine. 'Hope to see you soon. Cheryl and Dean
