FROM HANDS TO PLOW

WHAT MAKES A VITAL CONGREGATION?

It depends on who you ask. Here is part of my understanding based on my experience with Hand To Plow and twenty years of experience as a pastor, twelve leading small, rural congregations.

- 1. Every aspect of the life of the church returns to the mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. This **mission** is the bottom line or what the church is about. The way **our church** would carry out this mission will be unique. Biblical **core values** will drive our church as it makes disciples of Jesus Christ. (Hint: These values do not include buildings or money). There will be clear, tangible, and measureable steps that will be taken as we carry out the mission.
- 2. We will face two kinds of challenges as we carry out our mission: Technical and adaptive. Technical challenges will require your leadership, clergy and laity, to apply current know-how (knowledge, skills, procedures). Adaptive challenges will require the people with the problem to learn new ways (change attitudes, values, behaviors). One of the changes needed is that lay leadership work with the pastor (co-operate) to set clear direction for the church and establish goals that motivate people to work towards a shared vision. Another adaptive change needed is that we learn who the people in the community really are. Other changes are needed in the areas of developing lay leadership, outreach, connecting with un-churched families in the community, worship services that inspire young adults, and moving from management to mission,
- 3. Our mission will never change. It is what we **do.** Our vision will change periodically, probably every five years. It is what the congregation looks like as it is living into the mission. Our core values will rarely change. They influence how we make disciples of Jesus Christ. Our goals will change annually. They are what we do right now.
- 4. We will worship the Lord with all of our heart, soul, mind, and strength. We will engage the senses during worship as well as connecting with our minds. Emotion will play a role in our worship services and I will be inviting a response from the congregation. And we will move towards team planning, with the pastor as chief, rather than solo, worship planner. This will be an adaptive change for the congregation.



HAND TO PLOW

"I believe in this process so much that I will personally contribute \$500 towards the cost of the consultation weekend." That's Sandy Golden's take on the impact the Hand to Plow process will make at the Friendship United Methodist Church. She is revitalized and excited after participating in a peer learning group organized and implemented by our Annual Conference. By the way, so is your pastor!

Hand to Plow is a three-phase process that assists churches in the **revitalization** of their congregations. Friendship UMC started this process a year ago, and dreams of revitalization are building.

Phase one engaged together Sandy, Pat Kupiac, and Pastor Tim with laity and clergy from several churches in western New York in peer learning groups, called covenant groups. We gathered regularly and read and discussed books that included topics such as mission and outreach, leadership, and worship. Pastor Tim has a headache because he had to read 9 books. The readings also gave us ideas on how to define our vision and mission.



At its meeting on June 23, the Friendship church council unanimously decided to move along with the process: **Phase II.** This involves consultation with the Rev. Dr. Aaron Bouwens, Conference Director of Vital Congregations, who will visit our church for a weekend-long evaluation along with our district superintendant. Discussion and observations take place during this time. Rev. Bouwens and Rev. Dr. Sherri Rood will look for ways Friendship UMC can improve. (To be candid, a person on the church council pressed me to do this at the meeting. I'm sorry, that's "above my pay grade". Rev. Bouwens and Rood have the expertise we need.) At the end of Phase II, the church will be given a consultation report with recommended "revitalization prescriptions", which the church can vote to adopt or decline. (I'm sorry, these prescriptions cannot be filled by Jeff Marx at the Friendship Pharmacy, although he has offered to be pastor some Sunday if I will be pharmacist that day. This could be much riskier than *Hand To Plow*.) If the church adopts the prescriptions, it moves to the final step: Phase III.

Most outside consultants would charge a congregation between \$8000 and \$10,000 for a consultation weekend. The Annual Conference will pay the majority of the cost. Our share, based on our average worship attendance, will be between \$1000 and \$1300. I believe in this process and God's intention to renew my congregations so much that I will contribute any part of the cost to Friendship UMC exceeding \$1000. (Sorry, Jennie, no ride on lawn mower).

There are more than one billion hungry people in the world today, and there is enough food in the world to feed everyone 4.3 pounds of food every day.

Stop Hunger Now (SHN) strives to end hunger by providing food and aid to vulnerable areas worldwide. At the 2015 session of Annual Conference, several hundred Upper New York volunteers of all age groups and abilities helped with SHN's mission on Thursday, May 28, at The Oncenter's War Memorial Arena in Syracuse.

"Once again, I'm encouraged by the way we included a time for hands-on service at Annual Conference," said the Rev. Bill Gottschalk-Fielding, Director of Connectional Ministries. "Over 75,000 families around the world will have a nutritious meal because we United Methodist got together in Syracuse last month!"

Volunteers packaged 75,384 meals, exceeding the Conference goal of packaging 75,000 and the 2014 Annual Conference session meal-packaging total.

Each meal costs 29 cents and feeds one family. At this price, the Conference had to raise \$21,861.36 to reach the mealpackaging goal. The Conference has raised over \$21,000 – dona-

tions are still coming in – which helped purchase the materials necessary to package the meals. Church Mutual made a sizable donation, and its team members also packaged meals.

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God's Gracious Gleaners and United Methodist Men helped notably, working tirelessly to set up for the event, package meals, and clean up at the event's conclusion. At the beginning of both the

At the beginning of both the lunch and dinner shifts, there were not enough volunteers due to other events going on. But once this was made known, volunteers flooded the War Memorial, according to Cherish McGowan, administrative assistant to Connectional Ministries.

"It's hard to articulate the feeling I got when I looked around the War Memorial and saw hundreds of people working together, each doing their assigned task, laughing, dancing, and contributing to such an important cause," McGowan an important cause," mcGowan said. "I think the event was a very positive, uplifting event for the Conference again this year, and I was very happy to be a part of it." McGowan helped prepare the

McGowan helped prepare the Conference for the event, beginning last fall. She got in contact with *SHN* to discuss the event, meal-packaging goals and costs,



packaging shifts, and more. She also worked closely with the War Memorial to insure volunteers had meals available to them – as the event took place during meal hours – and to discuss other event requirements as well as helping with fundraising.

"Stop Hunger Now is a focused, dedicated, and impressive organization," said McGowan. The organization has packaged 201,540,739 meals in total, and they serve 71 countries."

McGowan said the Conference currently does not know where the 75,384 meals packaged at the

2015 AC session will go, but in 2014, the packaged meals were sent to Haiti and Malawi, areas that are gravely affected by hunger.

"I would like to thank each and every person who helped to make this event the success that it was, whether by donating their time, money, or both," McGowan said. "We will be doing another mealpackaging event with *Stop Hunger Now* at some point in the future, and we look forward to having another successful and meaningful event."


