

Speaking of United Methodists across the country, Donna Cullen, Co-Coordinator of the UNY Volunteers in Mission, said, "We're all connected. It's unfortunate that people in West Virginia had to go through this, but thanks to the connection, there's help." One unique way that the UNY Conference has assisted in this disaster recovery is by

sending a shower trailer down for volunteers to use. And this was no small feat.

The UNY Conference acquired this trailer in 2012. The trailer, donated by CT Express of Durhamville, was transformed from a typical hauler to a shower facility that allows volunteers to stay at disaster sites longer and be able to provide more services to help in the recovery of devastated areas. Six shower stalls were built in the trailer, along a narrow hallway running the length of the space. Each shower is cordoned off with walls and a door and accompanied by a small sink, vanity mirror, light and towel hooks. A high-efficiency washer and dryer were also installed to allow users to do laundry.

In addition to donating the trailer, CT Express owned by Tim Janes, made a five-year commitment to transport the trailer to wherever it's needed. However, the trailer has not been used in recent years due to its need for expensive repairs to the wheels and tires.

However, with the great need in West Virginia, the trailer was taken to the Service Truck Tire Center in Syracuse for the repairs. When they learned that that the trailer was to be used by volunteers responding to the West Virginia floods, Service Truck Tire Center paid more than half of the expense of the tires and wheels.

Once the trailer was repaired and ready to make its way to West Virginia, CT Express hired two drivers to drive it down in early July. When asked how long the trailer was used in West Virginia, Rev. Joe Auslander, UNY Conference Disaster Response Coordinator, responded, "The trailer is still down there and will be at least until the end of the year. There is a lot of recovery work still needed in West Virginia and the recovery will be a long process."

When disasters strike, we often forget all that is involved in the clean-up and recovery efforts. Volunteers helping in West Virginia can count on a nice shower and a way to clean their clothes, thanks to the UNY Conference's shower trailer and all of those who made the repairs and the transportation of the trailer down to West Virginia possible. This is another amazing example of the power of the United Methodist Connection to do things no individual church could do by itself.

Council of Churches News

The Cuba Council of Churches met at Cuba United Methodist Church on Tuesday September 13.



The Treasurer's Report indicated that the Council netted \$424 from the Songs of Hope Concert at the Palmer Opera House during Dairy Week, all of which was given to the Firemen.

The Community Food Pantry, housed at the First Baptist Church but sponsored by all Cuba Churches, received 33 grocery requests and 12 fuel requests in the past four months. Food was distributed during the Baptist Church's VBS week in cooperation with their school supply program. The Pantry remains well stocked at this time but needs financial support now for the Cuba/Rushford Holiday Assistance Program in two months. Foods needed in the coming months include traditional holiday fare like canned gravy, cranberries and yams, and boxed potatoes and stuffing mixes. Canned meat and soups, peanut butter and jelly, and cereal are always needed also.

Meals on Wheels deliveries are quite low at this time...only 14 delivered last week. Anyone needing assistance with meal preparation are eligible, there are no income guidelines. Attendance at the Cuba Nutrition Site remains strong four days a week.

The Council is hosting a booth at the upcoming Garlic Festival. It will be staffed by clergy and lay people from Cuba Churches. There will be a running slide show of church activities and a map with all churches marked. Requests for prayers will be taken. Plastic bracelets will be passed out that say "Peace" on one side, and "Cuba Council of Churches" on the other.

Crop Walk is scheduled for October 2, 1:30 at Cuba Rushford High School. Proceeds fight hunger. The Council is investigating the establishment of a scholarship for a high school senior demonstrating Christian values. A committee was formed to study this.

The Council of Churches' Thanksgiving/Advent Service is on November 27.

The Council of Churches will be preparing and serving a lunch for all Cuba Rushford teachers at an inservice day on November 21. Beef on Weck will be served and each church will be responsible for one assigned side dish for about 200 people.

A Progressive Dinner among the five Cuba Churches will be on Sunday May 7. People will travel from church to church for a five course meal. Last year, CUMC provided the salad course.

PROPHESY #10: Four World Empires in History

Daniel was a young man when troops from Babylon invaded Judah and took the Jews from the Holy Land. He and other friends who were part of the royal family and Jewish nobility (Daniel 1:1-5) were to be trained for three years and then were to entire King Nebuchadnezzar's service in Babylon. Daniel grew in wisdom and became the king's advisor.

King Nebuchadnezzar had a dream and saw a statue. The head was made of gold, the chest and arms were made of silver, the belly and thighs wee made of bronze, legs were made of iron, and feet were part iron and part baked clay. In the king's dream, a rock struck the feet of the statue, and the entire thing fell and smashed into pieces. The wind swept away the pieces of the statue, but the rock remained, became a mountain, and filled the earth. (Daniel 2:31-35)

Daniel interpreted the dream for the king. He said that the statue's head of gold stood for the king himself (and the empire of Babylon). The chest and arms of silver stood for a second, inferior, empire. (the empire of the Medes and Persians). The belly and thighs of bronze stood for an empire that would rule over the whole earth. (the empire of Greece). The legs of iron (and feet partially of iron) stood for an empire that would crush and break all the others. (The empire of Rome). The feet and toes that were partly baked clay meant that this forth kingdom would be a mixture, and not remain united. (Daniel 2:36-43) The rock stands for the Kingdom of Christ which will crush other kingdoms and endure forever. (Daniel 2:44-45)

So, the dream (given by God) acknowledged that Babylon would be an empire, for a time. The dream predicted that the Medo-Persian empire would come next, followed by the Grecian empire and then the Roman empire. Although the prophesy was centuries before, these empires did rise, and were recorded in history.

God gave this prophesy and it came true.

FILLED BEEF ROLL

1 beaten egg

½ cup finely crushed saltine crackers (about 14)

½ cup chopped onion

1/4 cup milk

1 pound ground beef

½ teaspoon salt

Dash of pepper


FILLING:

1 cup cooked rice

2 ounces shredded Swiss cheese (1/2

2 Tablespoons chopped green pepper

Mix the meat loaf ingredients together well. On a sheet of wax paper, pat mixture into a 10 inch by 8 inch rectangle. Combine the filling ingredients, and place over the meat leaving a 1 inch margin. Roll up like a jelly roll starting from the narrow end. Seal sides and ends. Place on a baking pan, seam side down. Bake at 350° for 35 minutes. Let stand 5 minutes before serving.

DUDLEY TAILS

Hi, It's Dudley. Today I want to tell you about some of my experiences as I visit the residents at Cuba Memorial.

As I pass the first nurses station, I am always greeted by one or more nurses.

Then I lead my master through the double doors that lead to the residences. I trot down the hall, entering the first room that I come to. If someone is there, my master asks if the resident would like a visit. Most do. Some are seated and my master holds me, so they can pet me. Some like me on their lap.

Then we continue down the hall to find others who would like a visit. I have "regulars" that always like a visit. There is a lady who reads in bed in the afternoon. She likes to have me on her bed. She is nice and always gives me dog treats. One day, she was having ice cream (which she shared.

Then there is the lady who hardly ever leaves her room and has daily pain. She told her daughter about us and said I was well behaved. She likes me on her bed too. And my master always prays with her before we leave.

Soon we pass the next nursing station where I am again greeted, and I see my circle of friends seated around the TV. I make time for each one. They tell me I am "beautiful" and a "good boy." Some like to pet me and others like to hug me. I visit quietly and my master talks with them.

The nurses tell me that I am so helpful to one man who has been isolated and lonely. Now he smiles when he sees me and talks to me a lot.

We visit another lady in her room. She tells stories while I rest on the floor. Sometimes an aide or person delivering laundry will come into the room. They always greet me and sometimes ruffle my hair.

Across the hall, we stop to see a resident who doesn't really remember me, but she loves dogs and likes to see me. We met her daughter once and she asked us to keep visiting her mother.

A few weeks ago something in the residence was different. As soon as we got there, we heard a loud voice that kept shouting. Recently the voice is a loud, constant "singing." Sometimes this bothers the other residents, but this is the lady's home too. One day the lady was sitting in the circle by the TV, "singing." I (Dudley) was uncomfortable. I visited the first three persons, but I really wanted to leave. Then we came to the "singing" lady. We stopped. My master greeted her and spoke while the lady sang. Then my master touched her arm and said, "you have been singing a long time. Don't forget to rest your voice." We moved on to visit others, and the "singing" stopped! She must have been very tired.

Sometimes we visit a man who is in a wheelchair and can't respond much. His wife is with him and helps him to pet me. It makes him happy.

I like it when the residents smile at me. I know they are glad to see me. We will go back again.
